### **Philippine Medical Act of 2023**

#### HOUSE PANEL APPROVES BILL REPLACING MEDICAL ACT OF 1959

According to Congresswoman Kristine Tutor of Bohol: "After 64 long years, we are much closer to putting in place a new governing law on the practice of medicine in the Philippines, now that the House Committee on Civil Service and Professional Regulation has approved the consolidated substitute bill."

She further adds the salient features of the committee-approved bill: "The Philippine Medical Association shall be integrated and acknowledged as the Integrated Philippine Medical Association (IPMA). All physicians, duly registered and licensed with the Professional Regulatory Board of Medicine (PRBM) and Professional Regulation Commission (PRC), shall automatically become members of the IPMA, maintain such memberships therein as a requisite to practice the profession, and shall receive benefits and privileges appurtenant thereto upon payment of the required reasonable fees and dues. Membership in the IPMA shall not be a bar to membership in other associations of physicians."

Regulatory powers within specific domains are vested in the Professional Regulatory Board of Medicine (PRBM), the Post-Graduate Medical Education Council, and the Integrated Philippine Medical Association. This means that these groups shall determine and define not only who can practice medicine in the country, but also who the medical

s p e c i a l i s t is. They will regulate the way exams are given and set standards on who to accept as diplomates and fellows of a specialty.

The approval of the house of representatives though, is just the initial step in making a law. The Philippine C o n g r e s s,

being a bicameral legislature, is composed of two co-equal houses: The House of Representatives and The Senate. Therefore, the bill passed by Congresswoman Tutor from the lower house, cannot become a law unless there is a counterpart bill coming from the Senate.

On August 17, 2023, President Dr. David Alagar, Vice-President Dr. Melito Ramos, and Secretary Dr. JAC Pimentel went to the Senate of the Philippines to deliver our stand on the Medical Act. The group went to the office of Senator Aquilino "Koko" Pimentel III and met with his legislative officers headed by chief of staff Atty. Daniel Salomon. In that meeting we insisted that orthopedics should be considered a separate and distinct specialty, and that we hoped the POA will be invited in the committee hearings in the Senate. The name of our



POA President was submitted to the Committee on Professional Regulation headed by Senator Ramon Revilla Jr.

The following is the stand of the POA, which we presented to the Senate and submitted to the different offices of the Senators:

 Orthopedics is a specialized field in medicine concerned with the diagnosis and treatment of musculoskeletal conditions. That being said, it should be considered a separate and distinct field rather than a subspecialty of General Surgery, as it is currently classified in the medical curriculum and in professional practice.

Though it may have started as a subspecialty of general surgery in the Philippines, advancements

in knowledge, application, and coverage have distinguished the field of Orthopedics as its own and standalone autonomous As such, specialty. separate Departments of Orthopedic Surgery have been established in most hospitals and medical centers. The specialty has diversified into several components, or subspecialties, representing the different regions of the human body. Residency training in Orthopedics continues to be a straight program, no longer requiring a year or two of general surgery training, as it used to.

2. Only physicians with postgraduate (residency) training under an accredited specialty program, and who have passed its diplomate board examination, should be accorded the title of 'medical specialist' of that field.

For orthopedic surgery, the Philippine Board of Orthopedics (PBO) is the only existing body that regulates and safeguards the quality of postgraduate orthopedic education and training in the country. It is the official accrediting and examining arm of the Philippine Orthopaedic Association, a group of professional orthopedic surgeons, that has been promoting the advancement of the science and practice of orthopedic surgery for 75 years. With well-structured, timetested, and up-to-date methods and processes of the PBO, we have time and again produced knowledgeable and competent orthopedic surgeons who are at par and attuned with the global standards.

complications that lead to disability or death in the course of treatment of a patient under a trained and licensed physician or surgeon should never in any case or situation be considered a criminal offense.

Complication is an unintentional and undesirable outcome arising from a medical or surgical treatment of a patient. It is a recognized event in medicine that can be prevented or minimized with proper training, application of best practices, provision of the appropriate tools and facilities, and awareness of its possibility. However, even strict observance of all these factors eliminate cannot completely the possibility of complications. Physicians should not be intimidated or hindered from treating patients for fear of a criminal offense should complications occur.

With all the above considered, we support the enactment of legislation in Congress that shall govern the basic education, post-graduate training, and professional practice of medicine in the country, which will replace the outdated Philippine Medical Act of 1959.

We, the POA, have to be proactive. We encourage you to write or talk to your favorite Congressman or Senator and push for the Orthopedic Agenda.

### POA TOWNHALL Meeting on Proposed By- Laws Amendments

A townhall zoom meeting was held Sept 8, 2023 to discuss two important proposed amendments which will be put forth during this years POA Business meeting. These amendments were the results of discussions by the BOT headed by President David Alagar to take care of the association membership. The proposed amendments focus on individuals and groups.

Amendment #1: creation of a candidate member (CM-POA). Recognition of fresh graduates from PBO accredited institutions into the POA as a candidate member allows them a taste of what it is to be a fellow. From attending business meetings (none voting) to being registered as a CM (same fees as fellows) to access/participation with learning opportunities and POA committees, the new graduates will helpfully be kept into the fold of the POA until they pass the diplomates within 3 years. These fresh graduates will hopefully transition from their training institutions to the POA.

Amendment #2: creation of affiliate societies. Because of numerous applications from special interest

groups, President Alagar has spearheaded the creation of an affiliate society section. As differentiated from subspecialties that identify a recognized orthopedic field, an affiliate society is one group of fellows that have a special interest to be connected with the POA.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the Business Meeting for its approval. This shall take place during the POA Business Meeting on Nov 16, 2023.

### **NCDA Approves PWD Poster**

National Council Disability **Affairs** (NCDA) recently gave its approval to the Person with Disability (PWD) poster project of the POA. Our President, Dr. David Alagar personally met with the NCDA Executive Director, Mr. Joniro Fradejas and requested that the NCDA go thru the PWD poster project of the POA.

This project started when one of our fellows asked if the POA can give quidelines on patients asking for medical certificates for proof of disability. The board of trustees then went to work and came across the NCDA Administrative Order Number 001 Series issued in 2021.

It is a fairly common scenario to see our patients with an obvious disability come to us and still ask us for medical certificates. I have a patient, who was a double amputee secondary to

diabetic gangrene come to my clinic to ask for a medical certificate so he can "renew" his disability card. Under the guidelines of the NCDA, these patients with obvious or apparent disability do not need to get a medical certificate from us, but instead they can go directly to the PDAO or Person with Disability Affairs Office of the city or municipality. Only on rare occasions, when the disability is not obvious, would they need a certificate from us.

The posters will be given during the annual convention to the POA fellows and the Board of Trustees (BOT) hopes this will benefit and educate our patients on the current guidelines by the NCDA. The BOT has also made inquiries to

#### DO I NEED A CERTIFICATE OF DISABILITY FROM MY ORTHOPEDIC DOCTOR TO APPLY?



Most physical disabilities that impair activities of daily living are obvious (e.g. amputated leg, deformed and non-functional extremity) and do not need a certificate of disability from an orthopedic specialist. You can proceed to the Person with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO) in your city or municipality for your application for a PWD ID card.

#### WHEN IS IT NECESSARY TO SEE MY ORTHOPEDIC DOCTOR?




Only when the disability is not obvious will there be a need for a certificate of disability from your orthopedic surgeon

#### WHAT IF I HAVE UNDERGONE TREATMENT, CAN I STILL APPLY FOR A PWD ID CARD?



If your disability has not been resolved despite the appropriate treatment, then you may request a certificate of disability from your orthopedic doctor. However, if the condition has been resolved, you cannot be considered as disabled.

Scoliosis is not automatically a disability. Please consult a certified Orthopedic Doctor for proper evaluation.

## An open letter to my fellow Filipino Doctors and Friends

(Iggy's letter to the Supreme Court)

"There can be no Reckless Imprudence (a criminal complaint) if it is not voluntarily done. It can only be voluntary if there was no legal obligation, no compulsion, nor persuasion and made without payment or recompense in any form a voluntary conveyance."

I write as a prisoner of Manila City Jail

and a doctor. I am not a lawyer but I have studied my case thoroughly with all the focus and benefit of time in jail. I am a licensed Physician and a highly trained and experienced Orthopedic Surgeon that still believes in the freedom of speech and of true Justice. As a human being I value independent and critical thinking because they are keys to our better perception of the truth.

I blame the complainant, a lawyer who teaches criminal law and married

to a physician, for intentionally filing a malicious accusation to make sure I suffered severely through sixteen years of litigation and harassment and my eventual conviction affirmed with finality by the third division of the Supreme Court.

I know in my heart and mind that a grave injustice had been foisted upon me because I am not guilty of any crime.

Well-meaning lawyers have told me that it is nearly impossible to reverse the decisions of the SC. But I live in hope - in humanity and justice despite my experience, and because I have seen so many people, some who I don't even know, wanting to help me fight for my cause of seeking Justice not just for me but now also for the protection of the Medical profession.

I have been convicted of reckless imprudence and sentenced to jail for one year and a day. I have now served three months and twenty five days of this sentence in one of the most congested city jails in the world. As you can imagine, this conviction has caused me and my family not only of mental suffering and humiliation but also of tremendous anxiety for my future as a surgeon and doctor.

I believe it is the first of its kind for a case of Reckless Imprudence to prosper in the courts as a result of a medical complication. This idea was further enhanced when veteran jail officers here in Manila City Jail told me that this was the first time to their knowledge, that a doctor, due to his profession, was convicted for reckless imprudence. And that such cases of reckless imprudence are almost always due to vehicular accidents. This was a complete eye opener for me and so I began my research and study while in jail.

The records show that the surgical instruments I used have been sterilized and all steps to avoid infection was adhered to by me and nursing staff. As a Doctor and Surgeon of more than thirty years, I can sincerely confirm that infections occur almost routinely and likely even daily in all hospitals of Manila despite our best efforts because there are factors beyond our control such as the hospital, the sterility of the instruments used and the factors associated with the patient himself. No surgeon can claim honestly that a post-

operation infection will never occur.

In my opinion, the most important and significant root cause of error or injustice in my case is the use of Reckless imprudence resulting in serious physical injury to charge me. Reckless imprudence requires that the act must be done "voluntarily". The law states: "Reckless imprudence consists in voluntarily, but without malice, doing or failing to do an act from which material damage results." No matter the outcome, be it slight, severe or even death, the manner or the circumstances in which the act or cause was done is what defines it to be a crime or of the nature of civil damages.

By definition, the word voluntarily as it is used in law means:

a. Acting or done without legal obligation, compulsion, or persuasion b. made without payment or recompense in any form a voluntary conveyance." A patient consults a doctor for a health problem in the hope of finding a cure. Persuading or compensating a doctor to act based on the agreement between patient and doctor is not a voluntary action but a joint agreement or partnership with the patient.

My case is entirely different from a true case of reckless imprudence where for example a pedestrian accidentally, and therefore without malice, gets hit by a driver-bearing vehicle and suffers physical injury as a result. A civil case of malpractice, negligence or incompetence on the other hand may be the right cases to file under because the alleged cause is not an act done in a voluntary manner. It is also clearly understood that payment or compensation was expected and was done so with a fully informed consent by the complainant. The treatment or action offered is based on the information offered by the complainant/ patient and subsequently agreed upon by both parties.

Moreover, I learned that in a published Supreme Court decision of a reckless impudence resulting in serious physical case, defined the sentence of such a crime to be a fixed two months and one day. Yet I am still here in jail now for more than three months and still counting

In my opinion the courts may have committed an oversight by putting more weight on legal or procedural technicalities rather than substantive human rights. Pointing out for example that it was my lawyer who was faulted by the courts for causing the loss of my statutory privilege of appealing my case in both the RTC and the CA. In doing so they also took my right to a fair trial that in my mere knowledge of the Law should be given automatically to those accused of criminal cases. And despite putting the blame on my lawyer, all punishment was given to me alone. And yet again I discovered recently in another Supreme Court ruling, a criminal conviction was reversed on the grounds that a lawyer's inability to perform his duties should not be cause for any accused to lose his constitutionally given right to liberty.

I therefore with hope and good intention that you my fellow doctors, individually or through the various medical and surgical organizations, to read and share this open letter to help us Doctors understand what has happened to me. I sincerely believe that by our awareness we will be able to protect our beloved profession better against predators and opportunist who are already using my case as a legal precedent to file a criminal cases for any complication arising from any of our treatment or surgery. It is time we Doctors heal and protect ourselves too, but eventually for the good of our patients.

We, the Board of Trustees of the Philippine Orthopedic Association (POA), express our unwavering support for the appeal for review of the case of the late Dr. Benigno A. Agbayani, Jr, by his friends and family. Dr Agbayani was an experienced and dedicated orthopedic surgeon who was incarcerated for an apparent common complication associated with a surgical procedure. Unfortunately, he suffered a major heart attack and passed on while in prison.

We strongly support the request for clarifications regarding the legal issues related to his incarceration. We firmly believe that this intervention is necessary to address the growing concerns among the medical practitioners who fear a similar fate in the future.

We believe that Dr. Agbayani's case raises important questions about the complexities, challenges, and risks faced by medical professionals, particularly surgeons who perform critical procedures every day. Learning from this incident can help prevent similar situations, ensuring the safety of both patients and medical professionals.

#### **ACCREDITATION**

2023 was a productive year for the Philippine Board of Orthopaedics, Inc. The Board triumphantly covered all the Training Programs' accreditation visits. # National Orthopaedic Residency Assistance Program (NORAP): An Update

The National Orthopaedic Residency Assistance Program is a program established by The Philippine Board of Orthopaedics, Inc. through a board resolution passed in its board meeting on the 11th of December, 2020 for the following intentions:

- departments in getting the best applicants to undergo their training programs by providing a pool of resident applicants best suited to the strengths and capabilities of the department to undergo the training program.
- To help the resident applicant find the institution that he/she believes will provide them with the best orthopedics training.

A website of the PBO was created to contain all information pertinent to orthopedic training in the Philippines, including NORAP. To facilitate the assistance of residents, regionalization of residency programs in the country was done, where all training programs in the Philippines were distributed into seven (7) groups. This regionalization is for:

- Helping the resident applicant decide where to apply depending on their area of residence.
- b. Giving them a bird's eye view of the available training programs with no prejudice to applying to a training program outside of the region of their residence.

A newly licensed physician who wishes to undergo training in orthopedic surgery in an accredited training program and participating in NORAP will have to apply to NORAP. Applicants will choose at least two training programs, ranking them as first or second choice. All applications will be submitted through the website, and the Committee will check the completeness of the requirements for residency training. The training department will also entertain walk-in applications on implementing this program. All queries concerning NORAP should be directed to the PBO website or through an e-mail addressed to the Committee.

Part of NORAP is a National Orthopedic Aptitude Examination (NOAE) made up of 200 questions to be conducted by the NORAP Committee for all applicants. The examination will only rank the

applicants from highest to lowest, giving a percentile rank, and the examination results will only be provided to the examinee and the training program of choice of a particular resident applicant within a week after the examination. It is hoped that the percentile ranking of the resident applicant, as a measure of their potential intellectual capacity, will help the department decide whether to accept the applicant. The department sets the percentile ranking of the applicant that is acceptable to them.

Since not all training programs have problems with the quantity and quality of their resident applicants, a survey was done last February 2023 on who among the accredited training programs in orthopedics will participate in NORAP. As of this writing, 12 institutions have signified their participation in NORAP:

This year, the first NOAE was conducted last the 14th of October 2023, after an orientation meeting via Zoom of all resident applicants. A total of 30 examinees took the exam. Setting it to an acceptable percentile rank at 56%, 50% of applicants are eligible for acceptance to a training program for this batch of examinees. Acceptable percentile rank will still depend on the department concerned, and the department will decide who will be accepted according to their percentile rank.

The training departments may schedule additional requirements like personal or online interviews of the resident applicants or a pre-residency period to

be spent in the department as deemed needed for the final decision on the acceptance of the resident applicant to their training program. The NORAP Committee will not be responsible for deciding who to accept. However, it will have a central repository of the requirements and documentaries, and these documents will be forwarded to the department to facilitate their selection process.

Once a decision is reached on who to accept into the institution's residency program, the department's Training Officer will forward the list of selected applicants to the Committee, who will record it in the National Orthopedic Residency Assistance Program. The applicants will then communicate directly with the residency programs where they were accepted.

With this pilot launch of the NOAE and feedback from the departments participating in NORAP this year, it is hoped that NORAP will eventually be accepted by training programs as an aid to their decision to fill up the required number of residents for the need of the department and getting the best applicants for their department.

After computing all the scores submitted by each trustee, and after due deliberation, there will be 6 residents to be conferred as an outstanding resident in orthopedics for the year 2023 during the PBO HOUR on the 74th POA Annual Congress at the EDSA Shangri-La, Mandaluyong City.

## Advancing Orthopaedic Education for Our Fellows and Residents



The POA Council for Orthopaedic Education embarked on a twopronged approach aimed at improving the delivery of orthopaedic training and education for our Fellows and orthopaedic trainees. The first set of activities was aimed at improving the knowledge and skills of the Training Officers of the 28 PBO Accredited Training Programs. Dubbed as the "Training Officers' Toolkit", a series of lectures were conducted via Zoom as well as face-to-face encounters, with experienced POA Fellows sharing their varying expertise in order to give better ideas on soft and hard skills needed for orthopedic training. The first session held last March 18, 2023, focused on lecturing and small group discussion skills, with talks entitled: "Preparing for Lectures", "Projecting and Connecting with Your Audience", "Preparing a Presentation", "Taking Clinical Pictures", "Making Anatomy and Biomechanics Interesting", and "Learning in Small Groups". A special talk on "Millennial Learners" was also presented.

The second session was held last April 18, 2023 during the Midyear Convention in Bacolod City. Ideas on teaching clinical skills were shared, with the talks focusing on "Effective Teaching Methods", "Effectively Teaching Surgical Skills", "Use of Core Clinical Cases", "Teaching Lower Extremity Immobilization for Students", "Teaching the Ponseti Technique", and the "Use of Simulation in the Clinical Skills".

A third session was held online last June 17, 2023 with a focus on "Preparing Written Examinations", wherein the PBO Blueprint for 2023 was presented during this session; this was followed by lectures on "Multiple Choice Questions: The Whys and Hows", "Common Errors in MCQs", and "Critiquing MCQs: How to Make Good Even Better".

The last session for the year will be held during the Annual Convention of the POA, where a panel discussion on the use of artificial intelligence in orthopaedics will be conducted.

The other set of activities of the COrE was dubbed "The Friday Five o'clock Habit". This lecture series was conceived in order to lay a common foundation for basic orthopaedics for our resident trainees across all 28 training institutions all over the country. It was also aimed at training our junior Fellows on how to prepare and deliver lectures to a virtual audience. The lectures were conducted by all twelve

subspecialty societies of the POA, with each society tasked to determine the basic coverage of the topics and assign the lecturers from among their members. From May to August, a total of 21 lecture sessions were conducted, with 92 lectures delivered by 87 POA Fellows to a minimum of 60 residents per session, covering the length and breadth of topics that a resident is expected to know. Feedback sessions will then be held to further improve the content of the lectures, as well as improve the editing, presentation and delivery skills of our Fellows.

The Council for Orthopedic Education would like to thank all the Fellows who generously contributed this year's activities in furthering orthopedic education, whether for training consultants or for residents. We would also like to thank the POA Board of Trustees for giving the green light and encouraging our teaching activities for the year. It is encouraging to see so many of our Fellows selflessly looking out for the next generation of orthopedic surgeons. It truly does take a village to raise a child. On behalf of the COrE, Maraming Salamat po!

# POA Orthogeriatric and Osteoporosis Working Group: Clinical Practice Guidelines about Osteoporosis, Fragility Fracture Management, and Research Projects about the Fracture Liaison Service



For the year 2023, the Orthogeriatric and Osteoporosis Working Group represented the POA in the formulation of the 2023 Philippine Clinical Practice

Guidelines on Screening, Diagnosis, Management, and Prevention of Primary Osteoporosis and Fragility Fractures Among Postmenopausal Women and Elderly Men, which was spearheaded by the Osteoporosis Society of the Philippines Inc. (OSPFI). The following POA fellows: Drs. Nathaniel Orillaza Jr., Mary Ruth Padua and Jonathan Ronguillo served as evidence review experts, while Dr. Czar Louie Gaston acted as a Panel Board Review Member. They all patiently participated in the monthly meetings for more than one year, duly representing the POA. The task force members, represented by six different organizations will submit the CPG to relevant stakeholders and policymakers (HTAC and DOH), with the hope of incorporating these evidence-based suggestions in the pathway of care for elderly patients with osteoporosis and fragility fractures under the universal health care.

The working group is also supporting the DOST funded Orthogeriatric-FLS Hip Registry project entitled "Multicenter Implementation of Orthogeriatrics and the Fracture Liaison Service for Elderly Hip Fractures: An Evidence-based Framework for a Sustainable Digital Health Registry" involving twelve institutions under the Department of

Health. One of the goals of this project is to expand the number of FLS programs in the country, providing training and assistance to the participating hospitals on how to establish their own Orthogeriatric-FLS programs. The project is expected to finish middle of next year.

Lastly, the POA Fellows from our working group, in collaboration with the (FFN) Fragility Fracture Network- Philippines, supported and were included in the authorship page of the regional research project entitled "Service Availability and Readiness for Hip Fracture Care in Low- and Middle-Income Countries

Throughout the course of the 74th Congress of the Philippine Orthopaedic Association, the Philippine Shoulder Society will be providing an excellent presentation on different, yet very common conditions of the shoulder. A second Ilizarov Mission was done at the Ilocos Training Regional Medical Center in San Fernando, La Union last April 29, 2023 for two cases of Infected Nonunion of the Tibia.

ASAMI members were also very active in surgical missions throughout Luzon. The aims of these missions were to assist our members with complex cases as well as to enhance the awareness and understanding of orthopedic residents on the Methods of Ilizarov. Most of the activities were held in training institutions where cases are first discussed with the training residents in a conference prior to the performance of the procedure. The first of such activities started in the Baguio General Hospital and Medical Center last March 24, 2023, where two cases of Congenital Pseudoarthrosis of the Tibia and Untreated Complex Fracture-Dislocation of the Elbow were managed.





Jose B. Lingad Memorial General Hospital in San Fernando, Pampanga was the host for the third surgical mission held last June 24, 2023. A total of seven patients with diagnoses of Malunion, Untreated Dislocation, Congenital Psedoarthrosis and Infected Nonunion were managed by five ASAMI members led by our President Emeritus, Dr. Juanito Javier.





A fourth Ilizarov Mission was held at the Mariano Marcos Memorial Hospital and Medical Center in Batac, Ilocos Norte last August 26, 2023 for two cases of Chronic Dislocation and one case of Tuberculous Arthritis of the elbow.



The fifth Ilizarov Mission for the year was held at the UP-Philippine General Hospital last September 17, 2024. Six ASAMI members and three Ilizarov Fellows joined hands and performed 2 Ilizarov Hip Reconstructions, 2 Congenital Tibial Cases, and 2 Chronic Infection cases.

What a year it was for the Philippine Musculoskeletal Tumor Society! A fruitful year of collaborations geared towards our mission of promoting continued education on orthopaedic oncology in the local, regional and international settings.

We kicked off the first quarter with a webinar for residents of the nine (9) member countries of the Asean Orthopaedic Association in cooperation the Philippine Orthopaedic Association (POA). July being Sarcoma Month, participated we in the virtual multidisciplinary tumor board sponsored by the Philippine College of Surgeons, in cooperation with the Surgical Oncology Society of the Philippines. Case presentations were moderated by our own Dr. Marjorie Sierra; and Dr. Donnel Alexis Rubio was the orthopaedic oncologist in the panel discussing management of a recurrent malignant peripheral nerve sheath tumor along with specialists in pathology, medical, surgical and radiation oncology.

# History of Philippine Orthopaedic Foot and Ankle Society

In May 2000, a group of orthopedic surgeons, headed by Dr. Emiliano Tablante, established the Philippine Orthopaedic Foot and Ankle Society (POFAS). The idea was brought up by Prof. James Sammarco, one of the foreign guest speakers during the Philippine Orthopaedic Association (POA) 50th Anniversary Convention, who also mentored Dr. Tablante during his fellowship. The pioneering group was composed of 18 orthopaedists sharing a common interest in foot and ankle (F&A) surgery.

Succumbing to growing pains, the initial years were noted to be difficult as none of the members of the Philippine Orthopaedic Association prior to Dr. Tablante, had any formal subspecialty training in foot and ankle surgery. The tenacity and perseverance of the society's leaders allowed them to maintain their primary objective and mold a formal foot and ankle society. This led to the formation of the first Orthopaedic Foot and Ankle Society in Southeast Asia, and the fourth in Asia.

During the first few years of the society's existence, numerous work shops were conducted to foster and promote the current treatment methods of the more commonly encountered foot and ankle problems. These work shops were well attended not only by the general orthopaedic practitioners but also by other medical specialist and allied health workers. The receptiveness from the Orthopaedic Society and other Medical Specialties gave the society tremendous sense of pride and satisfaction.











### **History of.**

4 years after, the society hosted the POA Annual Congress and was privileged to have hosted it simultaneously with the 2nd Asian Federation of Foot and Ankle Surgeons Conference. The convention graced by world-renowned speakers, who shared their expertise in the field of foot and ankle surgery.

The thrust of the society during the succeeding years was to encourage young orthopaedic residents and diplomates to seek for fellowship in Foot and Ankle Surgery in different areas of the world. The goal of the society is to further promote interest in the field of Foot and Ankle Surgery and stay updated in the diagnosis and treatment of foot and ankle diseases.

5 years after the formation of the society, the 2nd POA fellow with formal F&A subspecialty training, Dr. Alvin Abueg (2005) joined the group. He graduated from Jose Reyes Memorial Medical Center and did his fellowship with Professor Lee Kyung Tai in Korea. 3 years after, Dr. John Carag (2008) from Baguio General Hospital joined and he did his fellowship with Professor Hong Geun Jung Korea as well. 3 years after, the first POA fellow who took a F&A fellowship in Europe, Dr. Carlo Borbon (2011) from Makati Medical Center joined the society. He took his training under Prof. Hajo Thermann in Heidelberg, Germany. The society continued to grow, with fellows coming from different parts of the world, providing a better environment for growth and development as they are bringing back different techniques and perspectives in dealing with F&A cases. Qualified Fellows, diplomates or residents with special interest in foot and ankle are encouraged to seek fellowship for further training. The society also provides some guidance and assistance for these young colleagues to be able to land a good F&A training.

A decade of hard work, sweat and tears after, Dr. Tablante retired from being an officer of the society. In 2014, Dr. Borbon was elected as president of POFAS, and

is currently serving his term up to the present time. Dr. Tablante remains to be an Ex-Officio of the group. This was then, probably the next generation of foot and ankle orthopods. This was the time foot and ankle surgery have been becoming more and more popular to the community and in line with this, newer products, instruments and technology in F&A have been vastly growing. This was the period when the society will be receiving an average of 3-4 fellows, coming from International fellowship programs every year. As of the present time, the society has a total of 23 active members, with approximately 5 more new applicants coming back from their respective fellowship trainings by the end of the year, all trained in Foot and Ankle Surgery. Dr. Borbon would still recall a time when meetings would be casual and will consist of just 4 individuals. At the present time, having all active members on board, for which majority of the training institutions are well represented, meetings were always well attended by residents and fellows. Having a diverse group provided different insights and great flow of thoughts and deep discussions during the society's quarterly meetings.

The society continued its regular conferences throughout the years as well as its workshops and annual symposiums. Moreover, the group has

been actively participating in F&A meeting internationally whether as an attendee or as a faculty. Fundraising events such as a golf tournament was also hosted by the society. These events were somewhat hampered then by the pandemic. Because of the lockdowns and risk of exposure to the virus, faceto-face conferences were shifted to virtual meetings. The society then hosted the 1st webinar for POA fellows and residents during the pandemic. This was initiated by the group's desire to reach out to our colleagues, more specially the orthopaedic residents, whose training have been hindered by the lack of cases during these trying times. This first webinar was very memorable, as in a matter of less than 2 minutes, the maximum capacity for participants have already been reached. We then had to adjust for the succeeding meetings after. Due to this, the society saw the desire and willingness of fellows and residents to learn foot and ankle surgery, and hopefully instill interest in this field of subspecialty.

At the present time, the thrust and legacy for which was the society was initially built still remains, which is to promote foot and ankle surgery by sharing our expertise and knowledge to all fellows and residents and further developing

new skills in the said field. The group still encourages young aspirants, more specially to doctors practicing in less-served areas around the country to further widen the scope covered by the society and hopefully, will provide better service to our countrymen. Moreover, the society aims to develop Foot and Ankle Fellowship programs locally.

I will probably end this article with a phrase from Margaret Fuller, "If you have knowledge, let others light their candles in it." The aim of Philippine Orthopaedic Foot and Ankle Society revolves around this saying. This is probably the reason why the membership of the group has been increasing in numbers as well as the demand in foot and ankle fellowship in the country.

### Capacity Building of Local Faculty to Improve Clubfoot Training and Service Delivery

The Philippine National Clubfoot Program held the Global Clubfoot Training Advanced Clubfoot Treatment Course together with the Train the Trainer Course last 26-28 June 2023 at the Midas Hotel in Pasay City. Majority of the training faculty and participants were members of the Pediatric Orthopaedic Society of the Philippines affiliated with the different partner clubfoot clinics.

The Global Clubfoot Training materials comprise a complete set of standardized teaching resources designed to help train health care workers ranging from different levels of expertise in clubfoot treatment. The Advanced Clubfoot Treatment Course aims to develop



understanding and skills in the nonsurgical management of challenging cases such as atypical, recurrent, neglected, and secondary clubfoot, while the Train the Trainer course aims to develop the appropriate skills in effectively teaching and mentoring health care professionals involved in treating clubfoot. Such courses ultimately prepare the participants to organize and deliver the Basic and Advanced Clubfoot Treatment Provider Courses.

As part of the output of the Train the Trainer Course, four newly certified trainers served as faculty during the

Basic Clubfoot Treatment Provider Course held last 19-20 August 2023 at East Avenue Medical Center, Resident trainees from East Avenue Medical Center, Quirino Memorial Medical Center, Batangas Medical Center, and The Medical City participated in the 2-day training. Other trainers will get the chance to apply the skills acquired during the Train the Trainer Course in upcoming Basic Clubfoot Treatment Provider Courses to be held in Tacloban (Eastern Visayas Medical Center), Iloilo (West Visayas State University Center), and Manila (Jose R. Reyes Memorial Medical Center) in the last quarter of 2023.

The various efforts of and close coordination between the Philippine National Clubfoot Program, Orthopaedic Pediatric Society the Philippines, and the 29 partner clinics nationwide hope to address the gaps in clubfoot treatment access and management. The program is driven by comprehensive and qualityfocused care, which includes training providers, building awareness, improving clubfoot identification and referral processes, providing supplies for casting, tenotomy, and bracing and implementing strategies to improve treatment adherence. This concerted effort is in support of Run Free 2030, a global strategy to end clubfoot disability wherein at least 70% of children born with clubfoot in lower- and middleincome countries can access treatment by the year 2030.

#### The APOA @ 61



The Asia Pacific Orthopaedic Association (APOA) is one of the largest Orthopaedic professional organizations in the world, with 21 Federation

member countries, 24 National chapters, and 65,000 individual fellows. Few people know that the Philippines was there from the very beginning, in 1962, more than 61 years ago. In fact, the APOA was founded in the Philippines by eight Orthopaedic surgeons led by our very own Dr. Catalino Jocson, It was established initially as the Western Pacific Orthopaedic Association (WPOA) until it formally adopted its current name in 2000.

As one of the founding member countries of the APOA, the Philippines, through the POA, has always actively participated in the activities and programs of the APOA. In addition, there are also currently 12 individuals who are individual members of the Philippine chapter. However, since the establishment of Federation membership in 2016, all members in good standing of the POA are now automatically members of the APOA.

I would like to encourage more POA fellows to register and join as individual members of the Philippine Chapter and even consider Lifetime Membership. Individual members enjoy more privileges compared to Federation members. Individual members have reduced registration fees at congresses, and they are more likely to be granted Traveling Fellowships or Diploma course positions, be elected as Chair of any of the subspecialty sections, be a member of the Executive Committee, or even be elected to other high-ranking positions in the Association.

To join as an individual member, POA fellows can opt for a yearly annual subscription of USD 50/year or a one-time fee of USD 500 for Lifetime

Membership. As an individual APOA member, you can join any of the 12 subspecialty sections or societies under the APOA for a one-time fee of USD50 per subspecialty. You can join as many subspecialty sections as you wish. The APOA fellows can then be actively involved in all the activities of the Subspecialty section. For example, our young Orthopaedic consultants can join the Young Surgeons Committee, where young Orthopaedic surgeons can interact with colleagues from all over the Asia Pacific region.

I highly encourage our POA Fellows, especially our younger members, to join the APOA as more opportunities for learning and professional growth will open up to you. More individual members in the APOA will also benefit the Philippine Chapter and give the Philippines more representation in the APOA Council. Each National Chapter is allowed to have one Council Member for every ten Chapter members, up to a maximum of five Council Members.

#### My term as APOA President

During my term as APOA President, the APOA came out with several projects that will be implemented starting next year. First is launching of the interactive electronic library (e-library), accessible to members and young trainees. The e-library will be linked to an open learning platform in which interesting papers can be discussed with the respective authors. There will also be a new interactive website for easier access and communication. This website can be linked to the various National association websites.

Next, the APOA will release a standardized curriculum for training in the Asia Pacific region. This curriculum will be based on the minimum standards resident trainees require to be considered competent to practice general Orthopaedics and traumatology. Asia Pacific member countries will now have a common standard in terms of residency training.

There will also be diploma programs or subspecialty fellowship training programs in identified centers of excellence. This program will focus more on advanced fellowship training in the various subspecialties. These programs will range from 6-12 months in the different subspecialties. A diploma or certificate of training will be issued by both the APOA and the training institution after the training period.

#### Changes in the APOA: Presidential Line, Congress frequency and format.

There have been a lot of changes in the APOA since its formation 61 years ago (1962).

In 2020, there was a revision in the APOA constitution. The position of President-elect was abolished, and in its place, the positions of 1st Vice President and 2nd Vice President were created as the "Presidential line" of succession. The APOA Council members elect the 1st and 2nd vice Presidents.

Another significant change in the APOA is the frequency of the APOA Congress. Previously, the APOA held triennial congresses every three years. The interval was shortened, and from 2010 until 2022, biennial congresses were held – the last being hosted by the POA. However, starting 2024, the APOA Congress will now be held annually.

The APOA Executive Committee, the Secretariat, and the Scientific Program Committee will run the Congress. There will be a Congress President from the host country and the Congress Chairman from the APOA Executive Committee. All 12 Subspecialty Sections, headed by their respective chairpersons, will also contribute to the scientific program. This new format will result in separate concurrent sessions for all the subspecialties during the Congress. The host country for the Annual Congress will be selected from interested countries who submit their respective bids.

I also learned that there are only 14 orthopedic surgeons taking care of all Bruneian people with orthopedic needs in the country.

We visited the Rajah Isteri Pengiran Anak Saleha Hospital (RIPAS), the largest government general hospital in

















Brunei, gave talks to the members of the orthopedic staff and went around the hospital premises. We also visited the largest private hospital in Brunei, the Jerudong Park Medical Center. We also enjoyed our stay in the country, with a little river cruise adventure at Brunei river, home to Kampong Ayer,

which is Brunei's traditional village-onstilts above river waters. We also saw the longest bridge in Southeast Asia, known as the Temburong Bridge.

back to Manila, we brought Prof. Razak to the airport for he had to leave early for Indonesia to deliver some lectures.


On our 3rd day, we proceeded to the Philippine Orthopedic Center (POC); it is the oldest specialized government funded institution known to take care of the musculosketal health of Filipinos. Together with Dr. Soetjahjo, we were welcomed by the consultant staffs of the POC and were toured around the facilities. We observed that the POC is a well-rounded institution for orthopedics, serving a lot of Filipinos from all walks of life, most specially the needy.

The third country we visited was Thailand, where we met another Malaysian fellow, Dr. Harjeet Singh, who took the place of Prof. Razak. Our first agenda was to meet with the Royal College of Orthopaedic Surgeons of Thailand (RCOST); we felt the warm welcome from our Thai colleagues with the sumptuous dinner prepared for us.

Since it was a Sunday the next day, our itinerary brought us to the very popular tourist spot, the Ayutthaya National Park, which is a ruin of the historical Siam Kingdom. We also visited several Buddah temples, as well as the iconic image of the Buddha head, entwined within the roots of a Banyan tree.

The first hospital we visited in Thailand was the King Chulalongkorn Memorial Hospital (KCMH), a public general and tertiary hospital in Bangkok. The KCMH serves as the teaching hospital for the Faculty of Medicine of Chulalongkorn University, and is one of the largest hospitals in Thailand. We toured around the hospital facilities, including their operating theaters, out-patient clinics, and vast skills lab, where various international live surgeries are held. We also visited their cadaver lab where they kept a huge supply of cadavers.

The next day, we visited the Police General Hospital (PGH), which is headed by an orthopedic surgeon. We were warmly welcomed by the faculty



























and staffs of the orthopedic department, who toured us in their facilities. We also had the opportunity to deliver our lectures to them and their students.

Our last stop was in Malaysia; here we had the opportunity to join the 52nd Malaysian Orthopaedic Association Annual Scientific Meeting and Annual General Meeting held in Penang, filling our minds with knowledge and experiences. We were invited to the Presidential dinner, where we gained new friends from our ASEAN

colleagues. Penang was adorable with rich history combined with diverse ethnicity, culture, language and religion. We also had the chance to tour Georgetown Cannon Square in Penang Hill.

Our fantastic journey ends here... But let me end my story by saying: "Cendol with durian still lingers in my mouth!".

## **Philippines Warmly Received by India**

The country sent a delegation to the 28th International Young Surgeons Meeting last August 19-20, 2023 in Chennai. The group was led by Chinkin Coruña, a foot and ankle fellow from Corazon Locsin Montelibano Memorial Regional Hospital. Until recently, Chinkin served as the Geographic Representative for Asia of SICOT's Young Surgeons Committee (YSC), starting his recent promotion as its Vice-Chair after deliberation of the global Education Academy. The event was the first of its kind in India. showcasing its unique patient diversity, cuisine, and culture. There were over 400 registered participants, faculty, and industry partners from various regions of the predominantly-Hindu nation, with seven other countries (Egypt, Malaysia, Singapore, Philippines, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, and Hong Kong) represented.

The delegates from the Philippines included Daniela Kristina Carolino, Vanea Uyvico-Lim, and Alexander Cañares from Philippine Orthopedic Center, Juan Victor Tungul from East Avenue Medical Center, and Gabriel Antonio Escueta from De La Salle University Medical Center. All these outstanding young individuals had one thing in common: They each had winning research during the memorable Midyear in Bacolod City earlier this year. They were each awarded complimentary registration, hotel accommodation, tours, and meals abroad.

Dani talked about "Treatment of Pathologic Proximal Femur Fractures using the Improvised Megaprosthesis: Combination of the Hip Prosthesis and Intramedullary Nail." She was a speaker in the exclusive session guiding female orthopods. "The segment of Women in Orthopedics was a wonderful opportunity for me and my fellow female surgeons to showcase our research, build networks, and to indeed, lead by example in this road less travelled," says

Dr. Carolino. Discussing with peers, it was revealed that India has 15,000 orthopedics surgeons, 400 of which are female (3%). Citing the surgeon directory published by the POA, the Coruñas of Bacolod have counted a total of 835 orthopedic fellows, with 61 women (13%) from their unpublished manuscript on orthopedic manpower for the country. Comparing the two countries, the Philippines is just a fraction of India's population despite the decreased disparity in gender representation.

In the same session, the tumor specialist shared the spotlight with Vanea whose recorded lecture on "Functional Outcome of Arthroscopic Bankart Repair in Filipino Patients treated at the Philippine Orthopedic Center," was played remotely. Dr. Uyvico-Lim shares that the venue "was an eye-opener on how orthopedic surgery remains to

this day, one of the medical specialties with the least number of representation of female doctors, especially in India.

It was refreshing to see that there is growing movement and support to change this predicament. The conference gave us, Asian female orthopods, a platform to contribute to the orthopedic surgery society through our research presentations. Similarities in experiences in orthopedic training still transcend over differences in cultural and social practices."



I had a great time in the meeting, the fact that I was chosen and was able to present my paper and represent my institution and country was an honor and privilege. I am always thankful and grateful to Dr. Coruña and the SICOT organizers for choosing me as part of the delegates," are heartfelt words from Alexander. Dr. Cañares had the distinction of presenting "Local Infiltration Analgesia Among Adult Patients Treated with Hip Arthroplasty in Philippine Orthopedic Center: A Double Blind Randomized Controlled Trial," one of the entries in Best Scientific Paper Session, chaired by SICOT past president Ashok Johari and Prof. Gopinath Menon, both research publication giants in India.

Dr. Tungul's paper, "A Case Series: The Effectiveness of the Use of Ultrasound Guided PRP Injection for Ankle Sprains in patients at the Center for Musculoskeletal Science-Asia during the Pre-Covid Season" was warmly received in Sports Medicine Session. JV continues, "It was my first time to present research internationally. Not only did it boost my confidence, but it also gave me a chance to meet other orthopedic surgeons from different parts of the world. What stood out for me was the number of researches being presented. How all these help and develop management options in the field of orthopedics. I learned a lot

from the different workshops especially from the AO Basic Principles provided during the meeting."

The final study from the group was delivered by Gabriel Antonio. Dr. Escueta delivered "A novel budget-friendly home and office setup to enhance residents' orthopaedic suturing consistency in microsurgery" to a wide audience. He echoes and synthesizes observations by many of the delegates: "Research papers presented were of great value in updating and expanding our knowledge in the different subspecialties in orthopedics, as well as the difference in surgical techniques of other countries in contrast to what we do here in the Philippines. What stood out for me was the culture of friendliness and hospitality of our fellow Indian hosts. This was an eye-opener for me, in trying to reinvent myself and honing my skills through further training."

The two-day event included a YSC Session moderated by Dr. Coruña who shared the dais with Prof. Johari and Dr. Aju Bosco, who is the chairman of the YSC, and organizer of the event. Chinkin opened the floor for Aju who introduces what SICOT is, and he continued by showcasing the opportunities for new recruits being involved with the YSC. Eminent speakers involved veteran orthopaedic board examiners who




