We could not complain because our leader, frail as he was, still reserved his energy for the POA; and we were all witnesses to his dedication during last year's convention. The vision of him going up the stage with his rollator, struggling to stand and deliver a heart-felt speech will be indelible in my mind. Rest in peace, Mel, and walk effortlessly with the angels in heaven.

My duty as President would have been daunting without the help of our hardworking Board of Trustees. Dr. Marcelino Cadag, our Vice-President, ever cheerful and helpful, is the over-all chairman of this year's convention, working tirelessly for a successful annual convention while leading the very profitable POGI Golf tournament. Dr. Peter Quiaoit, a silent worker and very reliable Secretary, headed the pivotal property acquisition committee with our Treasurer, Dr. Mikey Bengzon and past POA presidents, Drs. Edward Wang, Peter Bernardo, and Edwin Jerd Siatan. Dr. Bengzon has been very strict in accounting for every peso. Dr. Pebbles Ganal-Antonio is the perennial co-chair of the scientific committee with Dr. Bengzon; and manages the committee with such expertise that discussions on this are minimal in meetings, as everyone trusts that Pebbles is on top of it. Dr. Alvin Amador heads various committees; the most taxing being his engagement with the Philippine College of Surgeons (PCS) and PhilHealth. Dr. Michael Muñoz heads the most successful advocacy of the POA -- the Joint Replacement Awareness campaign. Dr. Ricky Pecson is responsible for brokering our birthday benefits with Hi-Precision; and also engages the HMOs and the PCS. Dr. Jeanne Bertol is responsible for publications and the social events at

the annual convention ensuring an enjoyable congress for all. Dr. Maxie Escano is tackling the hard issues that face us as orthopaedic surgeons. Dr. Romina Mendoza-Torres is involved in geriatric orthopaedics and making sure that the entire country will have a Fracture Liaison Service soon. I have not mentioned everything that each BOT member



has contributed because the pages of Orthobalita would not be enough, but I can say that I am grateful for their commitment to the POA and that I am the luckiest president having served with these indefatigable professionals!

II. Vision, Strategic Planning

We started the year with strategic planning where we reviewed our mission and vision and reflected on the future of POA in the next 5 years. The group was composed of past presidents, the present Board of Trustees, the PBO Chairman, and the secretariat. We came up with 24 key initiatives to start in 2025 and hopefully accomplish by 2030. We set up our Viber chat group to make fellows aware of the current activities of the POA.

One of the initiatives we are proud of is the Joint Replacement Awareness advocacy which we are doing with the Philippine Hip and Knee Society (PHKS). We aim to increase awareness of the Filipino people on the ability of the POA, particularly the hip and knee surgeons, to perform joint replacements. We also aim to promote the Z-package benefits together with PhilHealth, as we are very fortunate to have our very own Dr. Edwin Mercado as it's CEO and President. It is our hope that more hospitals be contracted, and orthopaedic surgeons be better informed about the Z-package as we review the problems and concerns that doctors and hospitals encounter in the implementation of the program. The POA with the Philippine Spine Society (PSS) will also push for a Z-package on spine implants for spine trauma.

III. Achievements

Good News! The POA has bought a property in Oxford Street Cubao, Quezon City with a land area of 475 square meters and very accessibly located. The plan is to build a new structure that can be used as the permanent offices of the POA and the PBO. We plan to "future proof" this property so that our leaders will have the flexibility as to where they want to lead us. Owning a property is definitely an asset that will benefit us and future generations of POA fellows.

Another tangible benefit that the POA fellows have started to enjoy this year is the Hi-Precision laboratory package during our birthday month; in line with our intention of promoting good health for all our fellows. All fellows in good standing should receive an email authorizing them to choose a package of lab exams at any Hi-Precision branch. We also encourage our fellows to be more active by holding the POGI golf tournament in September and the First Dr. Camilo Te Memorial Fun Bowling tournament in November, The fellows also continue to be covered with a life insurance benefit from AIA insurance corporation.

The POA has also initiated a dialogue with the 2 biggest health insurance associations, AMHOPI and PAHMOC, with our friends from the Philippine Academy of Ophthalmology and the Philippine Society of Otolaryngology Head and Neck Surgery so that our interests will be heard. We have also been engaging with our friends from the PCS and they have, in fact, accepted our proposal to become a federation member; however, this will take time as PCS will have to make amendments to their constitution and By-laws.

We continue to monitor the Philippine Medical Act that is still pending in Congress. The POA has a clear position, and we hope to be heard by legislators once they resume committee hearings. Although with the current turmoil they are in, we feel that this bill will be in the back burner.

The POA has three new advocacies for this year aside from the existing advocacies like



Road Safety. The first, and very successful project, is the Joint Replacement Awareness which we promote together with the PHKS headed by their President, Dr. Herminio Valenzuela. We have been to Luzon (La Union), Visayas (Iloilo), and Mindanao (Cagayan de Oro); and we plan to continue for the next 2 years until the Z-Package benefits are delivered smoothly throughout the country. We also have our Geriatric Advocacy in coordination with Dr. Irewin Tabu with the aim of doing early surgeries for the elderly. The third is Disaster Preparedness in coordination with Dr. Gregorio Marcelo Azores. The recent devastating earthquakes in Cebu (Visayas), Baguio (Luzon), and Davao (Mindanao) have reminded us that natural disasters are part of our lives in this country, so it is imperative that we are wellinformed and fully prepared.

We continue to represent the Philippines and promote the POA in the international front. An exciting development is that Societé Internationale de Charge Orthopedique et de Traumatologie (SICOT) will accept us as a federation member after we talked and wrote to the leadership on behalf of the POA. Once finalized, fellows will enjoy the benefits of a SICOT member and have access to their educational materials. Fellows are currently federation members of Asia Pacific Orthopaedic Association (APOA). We are active members of the ASEAN Orthopaedic Association (AOA); and, as the AOA President for 2025, brought a team to Cambodia for a highly successful outreach last August. Drs. JP Leung, Danny Dungca, and myself delivered lectures to Cambodians which I believe were appreciated by our counterparts. Moving forward, the POA intends to acknowledge all our international speakers to encourage fellows and develop more speakers representing the POA bringing honor and respect to the Philippines.


Lifetime Achievement Award


Most Outstanding Oncologist Award


Through the combined efforts of the 2025 Board of Trustees and the Procurement Committee, the vision of a POA headquarters is finally taking shape. What once was a hope is now becoming a concrete reality.


Timeline of Events 2024

- May The Procurement Committee is formed, composed of Dr. Edward Wang, Dr. Peter Bernardo, and Dr. Jerd Siatan, with BOT members Dr. Peter Quiaoit and Dr. Mikey Benazon.
 - -- To capture the needs and preferences of our members, a survey is initiated among chapter and subspecialty heads, led by Dr. Quiaoit.
- August 9 The finalized survey is approved and disseminated by the POA Secretariat.
- October 24 Survey results are presented in a meeting attended by POA President - Dr. Jac Pimentel, Vice President - Dr. Mar Cadag, POA Legal Adviser - Atty. Rodmel Bautista, and the Procurement Committee.
- November During the POA Business Meeting, the general membership formally approves









2025

- February A PHP 65 million budget is approved for the property acquisition. The search officially begins, with several suggestions coming from fellows.
- April Two potential properties shortlisted. Cubao are Consideration of properties were based on cost, location and accessibility. Furthermore, due diligence was exercised like review of titles, site visits, financial review and consult for lawful processes.
- May A promising site on Oxford Street, Cubao, is identified. The BOT meets with the owner via Zoom, A PHP 200,000 reservation fee is paid.
- June A PHP 5 million down payment is made to move the acquisition forward.
- August The property turnover takes place at PNB Makati. Documentary stamp tax and related fees are settled.
- September 16 Transfer tax and deed registration are completed. A structural assessment of the building is also carried out.

What's Next?

Three (3) construction firms have expressed interest and are currently preparing their bids for the renovation and fit-out of the property. The BOT

will review these bids in the next two meetings and will present the selected firm for approval at the Annual Business Meeting.

Dr. Miles Dela Rosa: A Life Inspired, A Legacy of Inspiration

I have heard this story several times. When Miles was a first-year medical student, he fell victim to a holdup and stabbing. With a chest wound and gasping for breath, he was rushed to the then National Orthopaedic Hospital (NOH), where he had emergency operation and was saved from a lifethreatening ordeal. Little did he know that this experience would inspire his life's calling. He would always recall with awe how a team of orthopaedic surgeons — assembled by no less than his uncle, Dr. Benjamin V. Tamesis, then Director of NOH - handled his case with astute judgment, precise timing, and skill. At such a formative age, Miles, a doctor-to-be, was inspired by those who saved him, and he dreamed of one day becoming part of such a team. After passing the medical boards, he returned to NOH, pursuing the dream born from that defining moment.

I have known Miles for over four decades since 1985, beginning with his residency in orthopaedics. Our paths remained intertwined when he became a consultant, and later, when he was assigned to the same service I had served for more than thirty years.

At the Philippine Orthopaedic Center (POC), doctors are organized into groups traditionally called "services." For 27 years, Miles and I worked side by side in one service. Those years brought countless opportunities to share not only our professional visions and challenges, but also personal stories — family matters, hospital affairs, even politics and humor in orthopaedics.

From his early years as a consultant, Miles stood out for his curiosity and drive. He eagerly embraced opportunities for self-improvement, attending scientific meetings both local and international. His passion for orthopaedic education was evident, particularly with AO, whose systematic methods of teaching — anchored on psychology and behavior — deeply resonated with him. At the very first AO Basic Course held at POC in 1993, having finished his basic

and advanced AO courses, Miles was a faculty member. That step began his lifelong journey with AO. Only a year later he joined a major event of AO East Asia (AOEA) by being a representative of the Philippines during its inaugural meeting in Hong Kong in 1994. Doc Miles became a dedicated AO faculty — locally, regionally, and internationally — with numerous teaching stints even in Davos, Switzerland, the seat of AO.

Later in 2007, AOEA evolved to be named AO Trauma Asia Pacific (AO TAP); and in the same year, Doc Miles was elected as Editor-in-Chief of its newsletter. In 2008, he held the position of Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of the ASEAN Orthopaedic Association. Doc Miles was a Board Member of AO TAP representing the Philippines from 2009-2011; during which time he was chosen to serve as Chairman of Community Development for the Asia Pacific Region of AO Trauma International.

In the Philippine orthopaedic community, Miles became part of the POA Board of Trustees in 1997 and rose to become the 56th President of the POA in 2005. Soon after, he was elected President of the ASEAN orthopaedic Association. Inspired by the example of his uncle, Dr. Benjamin V. Tamesis, his cousin Dr. Teresita Altre, and his many friends in the POA, Miles embraced the challenges of leadership with fervor and dedication.

His service extended far beyond the POA and AO. At different times, he was President of the Osteoporosis Society of the Philippines Foundation, Inc.; Chairman and Faculty of the Department of Surgery of FEU-NRMF, where he held the rank of Associate Professor; Chairman of Community Development for AO Trauma International in the Asia Pacific; and Medical Director of UDMC from 2019 until his passing.

But among all his roles, education was his greatest passion. Speak to him about it, and he would immediately stop whatever he was doing to engage in a thoughtful exchange. Teaching was not just his responsibility — it was his joy. His gift lay in transforming ordinary moments into meaningful lessons.

Residents remember him for the challenging situations he would create — asking grilling questions, pressing them to think critically. Though sometimes uncomfortable, these moments always ended in deeper understanding. He had a way of sparking curiosity, encouraging learners to seek answers themselves. This method, which he perfected, reshaped the perspectives of countless trainees.

Those who passed under his mentorship know how profoundly he touched their lives. He inspired them to become better versions of themselves. Truly, each of us carries within us a little of Miles dela Rosa.

A Tribute to a Friend, Colleague, and Past POA President

Dr. Melito Antonio Ramos or Mel, as we all fondly knew

him, is a great loss to the Philippine Orthopaedic Association. He led us through our Diamond Anniversary Celebration in 2024 despite facing challenging health issues. Even in the midst of physical exhaustion, he worked tirelessly to ensure that all programs set by the POA would be completed before the start of the Annual Convention. That was the kind of man he was - an Action Man against all odds.

I have known Mel since our residency days, from the very first to the very last. I still remember how our trainers and mentors in Trauma Service, Hand Service, Child and Adult Orthopaedics, and Spine Surgery trusted us with even the most difficult cases all on our own, as long as we could clearly present our operative plans beforehand. That trust boosted our confidence so much that barely a month after graduation, we were already performing Scoliosis surgeries and Total Knee Replacements as consultants.

Although our careers took separate paths, we stayed in constant communication. Later, I invited him to be part of a training institution, knowing

he would lend his talents and help make the program stronger. He went on to take on greater responsibilities, eventually stepping into leadership roles. I entrusted him with these positions, fully confident in his integrity and dedication. This is also why he was often appointed to the most demanding posts - particularly in a 450-bed tertiary government medical center. In each role, he worked tirelessly and meticulously, never stopping until the job was done. His work ethic and commitment were unparalleled, making him the kind of person everyone wanted on their team or better yet, leading it.

As a trainer, Mel was tireless in teaching residents and assisting them in surgeries, sharing both the pearls and pitfalls of techniques to ensure better outcomes. He was a father, brother, friend, colleague, and mentor which is why he was so loved and respected by those who trained under him. He became an inspiration to his daughter Angela, who chose to follow his path in Orthopaedics. His medical condition never stopped him from proudly assisting her in her first surgery as a resident. Everyone who witnessed that moment could see his joy and pride.

Mel was also the kind of person you would think of first when reliability

and conscientiousness were required. That is why, when we were asked in the Board to nominate a Trustee for the POA, I did not hesitate to put his name forward. I knew he would steer the Association with integrity, uphold its highest standards, and embody its core values.

To his family, in their words, he was a caring Father, a Loving Husband, a dependable Brother, a trustworthy Colleague, a supportive Mentor and a Friend anyone can turn to. He has stood strong, always supporting those around him, poured his heart into creating a comfortable home for his family and became a steady foundation in his workplace and they are deeply grateful for everything he has done.

No words can ever truly fill the void he left behind, but we hold on to the hope that the outpouring of love and respect shown in the days before he was laid to rest has comforted his family with the knowledge that he brought more good, more hope, and more love than most could ever give in a lifetime.

AOA Senior Travelling Fellowship: Never Too Late to Learn

The ASEAN Orthopaedic Association Senior Travelling Fellowship (AOA-STF) is an annual program that began in 1987. Senior orthopaedic surgeons from ASEAN member countries travel together over a two-week period presenting lectures and research papers in their fields of expertise.


May 13-15, 2025 | Bangkok, Thailand. The 2025 AOA-STF met at the Grande Centre Point for a welcome dinner hosted by Prof. Keerati Chareancholvanich, president of the Royal College of Orthopaedic Surgeons of Thailand (RCOST).

We visited Siriraj Hospital, the oldest and largest public hospital in Bangkok and the primary teaching facility of Mahidol University's Faculty of Medicine; where we observed a robotic-assisted TKR, noted for its precise technique and adherence to standard operative timing. At the spinal rehab unit, Dr. Cholavech Chavasiri showcased the My World Simulation Room - equipped with an aquarium, fiber optic lights, and wallclimbing areas for sensory and physical rehabilitation. We also visited the Siriraj Bimuksthan Museum, followed by a traditional Thai massage and a dinner hosted at the Chocolate Factory, Prannok, where we met Dr. Saranatra Waikakul, past president of RCOST.

Next day was a tour of Thammasat University Hospital's advanced orthopaedic services – robotic bilateral TKR, 3D-printed prostheses, and the anti-gravity treadmill for physiotherapy; the fellows presented during their weekly conference; a visit to Chao Sam Phraya National Museum in Ayutthaya; and, dinner at Wat Chaiwatthanaram's Kru Juk Restaurant.

May 16-18, 2025 | Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. The Malaysian Orthopaedic Association (MOA) President Datuk Prof. Dr. Sabarul Afian Mokhatar hosted a welcome dinner joined by ASEAN orthopaedic presidents, past leaders, and invited guests. We then attended







the MOA Annual Convention, themed "MOA in Motion: Journey Towards Orthopaedic Excellence." The event had a grand opening ceremony featuring a creative robot mascot symbolizing innovation and resilience. A traditional dinner at Pelita Nasi Kandar, followed by a short tour of Kuala Lumpur and Chinatown Market was a fitting end to our day. The final evening featured the President's Dinner, filled with fellowship, festivities, and cultural performances. Guests donned traditional attire, and a surprise performance featured the wife of the Indonesian Orthopaedic Association president dancing and singing the Poco-Poco.

May 19–21 | Bandar Seri Begawan, Brunei. Arriving in Brunei, I was amused to see a Jollibee at the Brunei airport. We visited two hospitals: Jerudong

AOA Forges Stronger Future with New Leadership and Enhanced Regional Programs

The ASEAN Orthopaedic Association (AOA) celebrated a year of growth and strategic development at its Annual Council Meeting on November 13, 2025, in Jakarta, Indonesia. This pivotal gathering brought together council members and observers from across the region to formalize a transition in leadership and outline ambitious plans for collaboration, education, and outreach in the coming years.

A Year of Milestones and New Beginnings

As the Outgoing AOA President, I reflected on my successful term, initiatives that highlighting have strengthened regional ties and elevated orthopaedic standards. Key achievements under my leadership included a successful outreach program in Cambodia with participation from several member nations, the continued publication of the AOA Journal in collaboration with the Malaysia Orthopedic Association, and robust support for the various AOA Travelling Fellowships (Junior, Senior, and Australia-New Zealand). I also emphasized the expansion of the Residents Review Course, committing to the participation of five residents from each country-a crucial investment aimed at developing future AOA leaders and potentially paving the way for a diploma course and an official ASEAN fellowship program. The association's increasing international

presence at major conventions was also noted, alongside the warm welcome extended to Timor Leste into the AOA community. The formal transfer of leadership from myself to the incoming President, Prof. Ismail Hadiesobroto, the immediate past president of the Indonesian Orthopaedic Association (IOA), took place during a gala dinner at the Raffles Jakarta on November 13, 2025.

Elevating Education and Global Exchange

Secretary General Dr. Peter Lee, who also served as the lead for the Cambodia Outreach Program in Phnom Penh, reported on the extensive humanitarian efforts, which featured a large team of participants from Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, He also provided details on the Residents' Review Course, a brainchild of Dr. Denny Lie. The course is noted for its evolution into a dynamic, case-based discussion model led by ASEAN faculty, designed to deliver key learning points and foster unity among residents. The comprehensive curriculum covers a wide range of orthopaedic topics from 2023 to 2025, including MSK Tumours, Spine, Trauma, Sports, Arthroplasty, Paediatric Orthopaedics, Infections, and Hand & Microsurgery. To ensure its sustained impact, the Council approved the course's continuation beyond 2026, focusing on "levelling through supplementary midyear webinars, evaluation forms for

residents, and innovative formats such as an Olympiad-style session.

Future Outlook: Fellowships, Congresses, and Expansion

The association reviewed the successful 2025 Travelling Fellowships and confirmed the extensive itinerary for the 2026 programs, continuing the vital tradition of regional and international professional exchange. The confirmed dates and hosts for the 2026 Fellowships are:

- AOA Senior Travelling Fellowship: May 8-17 (Hosts: VOA, SOA, and IOA)
- AOA Junior Travelling Fellowship: October 11–25 (Hosts: IOA, VOA, SOA, concluding at RCOST)
- AOA-Aus/NZOA Travelling Fellowship: October 15–25 (Hosts: POA, MOA, and RCOST)

Looking ahead, the AOA solidified the hosts for its future Annual Congresses through 2030, demonstrating longterm stability and commitment: Thailand (2026), Malaysia (2027), Singapore (2028), Vietnam (2029), and the Philippines (2030). The Council also announced a planned Outreach Program in Phnom Penh for 2026 and strongly encouraged all national associations with existing outreach initiatives to welcome participation from other ASEAN volunteers. The reports from the Education/Research

- Research integrity and authorship including the role of AI like ChatGPT



The event featured a lay forum and lectures led by specialists who provided practical, science-based information to help women navigate the physical and emotional changes associated with midlife and aging. Participants were empowered with knowledge on disease prevention, early detection, and lifestyle changes to promote healthy aging.

Capping the summit were free health screenings, including Visual Inspection with Acetic Acid for cervical cancer, clinical breast examinations, and bone density screening for osteoporosis. These services were performed by

Healing Amid Tremors: Orthopaedic Surgeons Rise to the Challenge After Cebu Quake



September 30, 2025 | A magnitude-6.9 earthquake struck off the coast of Cebu province, near Bogo City late in the evening. The quake was shallow and violently felt across northern Cebu, causing widespread structural damage — collapsed homes, churches, walls — ushering in one of the country's deadliest seismic events in recent memory. By early reports, 75 lives were lost and hundreds injured.

Hospitals and medical facilities in the quake zone were quickly overwhelmed, with surging numbers of trauma patients requiring urgent care. In the face of this crisis, the orthopaedic community in Central Visayas mobilized swiftly and decisively.

A Surge of Orthopaedic Response

The POA - Central Eastern Visayas Chapter, under the leadership of Drs. Alexander Ho Jr. And Precious Grace Handog, President and Vice President, respectively; with the support of Dr. Edwin Mercado, President and CEO of PhilHealth; POA President, Dr. Justinian Pimentel IV; and, Pam Baricuatro, Governor of Cebu Province, mobilized a dedicated team of orthopaedic surgeons, residents, and fellows to the affected areas to treat severe musculoskeletal injuries, restore function, and give hope to patients whose lives had been violently disrupted.

The team successfully performed 10 orthopaedic surgeries, spanning from fracture fixation to reconstructive procedures in one operation cycle.

Orthopaedic residents and fellows played a crucial support role — assisting in preoperative planning, intraoperative tasks, postoperative care, and rehabilitation. Their involvement multiplied the team's capacity and embodied the spirit of medical solidarity during disaster.

From Wards to Home: Patients Discharged, Lives to Rebuild

Thanks to coordinated efforts, the surgical patients have now been discharged and have begun the journey of recovery and rebuilding. They return not only with healed bones and repaired tissue but with renewed resolve. The orthopaedic team continues to monitor their follow-ups and support rehabilitation in coordination with local health services.

Many of these patients lost homes, livelihoods, or community anchors. But in their restored mobility lies the possibility of regaining independence and returning to daily life.

Lessons and Reflections

The quake underscored both vulnerability and resilience. The Philippines sits squarely on the Pacific



"Ring of Fire," and seismic risks are ever-present.

In the aftermath, the orthopaedic response in Central Visayas showcased the value of readiness, teamwork, and rapid deployment.

A Call to Rebuild, Together

As the rubble is cleared and reconstruction begins, Cebu's communities are looking ahead with hope. The orthopaedic team's work, though technical and surgical, carries a larger symbolic weight: a promise that in the darkest moments, healing hands, solidarity, and resolve endure.

To the patients now returning home: your resilience inspires. May your healed limbs carry you forward toward renewed purpose, connection, and the rebuilding of what was lost.

POA-PHKS Collaboration: Joint Replacement Road Show and PhilHealth Ortho Z-Package Awareness Caravan

One of the most expensive procedures in orthopaedics is joint replacement, particularly the implant devices. Fortunately, PhilHealth's Ortho Z-package benefits program covers cost of both hospitalization and joint implant devices.

As Trustee-in-Charge of the POA's Joint Replacement Awareness advocacy and Vice-President of PHKS, Dr. Michael Muñoz, spearheaded the POA-PHKS collaboration to continue the traditional PHKS joint-replacement-roadshow and extend its reach to various government hospitals in Luzon, Visayas Mindanao that have contracted the Ortho Z-package. We met with new PhilHealth acting President and CEO, Dr. Edwin Mercado, an orthopaedic surgeon who knows the orthopaedic concerns related to Filipino needs by heart and he showed his ardent desire to be engaged with the project. He encouraged the team to optimize the use of the Ortho Z-package provided by PhilHealth and proposed promoting the Ortho Z- package through media coverage in press conferences.

We started the POA-PHKS roadshow caravan last March 9, 2025 in North Mindanao Medical Center (NMMC), Cagayan de Oro. We were honored with warm accommodations by Dr. Jose Chan - outgoing Medical Center Chief (MCC), Dr. Peter Quiaoit - incoming NMMC MCC, Dr. Justinian Aquilino IV Cyril JAC Pimentel - Orthopaedic Chairman, and the NMMC orthopaedic staff. Drs. Herminio Valenzuela and Andrew Gabriel Tabberrah, PHKS President and Secretary, performed the knee and hip joint replacement surgeries, respectively. After the successful surgeries, a press conference followeD in Limketkai Luxe Hotel hosted by the PHIC. A number of media personalities covered this momentous event. The media coverage included: a live press





conference, an FB live, local radio and newspaper, online news and various social media platforms.

The 2nd POA-PHKS joint replacement roadshow was held last June 27-28, 2025 in the Ilocos Training and Regional Medical Center (ITRMC) in La Union, Region I; and, were honored by the great hospitality of Dr. Eduardo Badua - ITRMC MCC, Dr. Eric Piscawen - Chairman of Orthopaedic Department, and Dr. Maximiano Escano - POA Trustee and ITRMC orthopaedic staff.

We were able to perform 3 joint replacement surgeries: a TKA for severe OA, a THA for AVN and a complicated revision case of a neglected failed fixation of a pertrochanteric hip fracture. PHKS fellows who performed the procedures were: Drs. Valenzuela, Muñoz, William Chuasuan Jr. and Marcelino Cadag. A press conference on Joint Replacement Awareness and the PhilHealth's Ortho Z Package Benefits program followed and was attended by the staff of PhilHealth Region I and by 13 local media representatives from



La Union and Pangasinan. Various media representatives from Manila Times, Philippine Daily Inquirer, Bombo Radyo, Love Radio, Radyo Pilipinas, Pangasinan Today online and Aksyon Radyo La Union covered the said conference.

A third successful joint replacement roadshow was held in Western Visayas Medical Center (WVMC) in Mandurriao, Iloilo last August 29-30, 2025. The POA-PHKS Team was composed of Drs. JAC Pimentel, Cadag, Valenzuela, Muñoz and Dr. Nilo Paner, PHKS Ex-Officio. They were warmly welcomed by Dr. Raoul Cañonero, Orthopaedic Chairman and the WVMC staff; and, paid a courtesy call to the Chief Training Officer, Dr. Guadalupe Matejka. Both expressed their gratitude for the team visit and to be chosen to be part of the POA-PHKS program. As part of the awareness program, a press conference was held with the PhilHealth Iloilo staff led by Mr. Larry Tabsing, Regional Vice-President. The conference was attended by the hospital staff, orthopaedic colleagues and local media.

Two joint replacement surgeries were performed, one TKA and one THA. A case of debilitating knee OA was discussed with the residents together with ortho staff from WVMC and other ortho fellows from neighboring hospitals. A live broadcast TKA surgery was performed "tourniquet less" by Dr. Paner. The next day, a case of severe hip OA was discussed and a live broadcast surgery was performed by Dr. Valenzuela using the "mini posterior" approach. Both joint replacement surgeries were performed under the Ortho Z-Package Program Benefits; this includes patients' hospitalization, doctors' professional fees, joint implant cost and physical rehabilitation.

If the government has 4Ps program (Pangtawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program), we at the POA also have 4Ps in our advocacy in promoting joint replacement awareness particularly for

our less fortunate countrymen. Our **4Ps** means "ang **POA**, **PHKS**, at **PhilHealth** para sa **Pilipino**". When contracted with Ortho Z-package benefits, an institution can provide surgeries for joint replacement and trauma patients with provision of implants. Hence, this collaborative effort promotes awareness, and, more significantly, it advocates good health by saving lives and limbs.

This is one of our answers to our nation's call.

We encourage you our dear colleagues to be part of this endeavor and help us spread the good news to our people specially the indigent and underserved.

International Consensus Meeting 2025

May 8-10 | Istanbul, Turkiye. Almost 900 participants from over 50 countries attended the 3rd meeting of the International Consensus Meeting (ICM) for Periprosthetic Joint Infections (PJI) at Lutfi Kırdar International Congress and Exhibition Center to update the recommendations based on current evidence for management of PJIs.

Experts in the field of Hip and Knee Arthroplasty and Orthopaedic Infections from all over the world were involved -- Orthopaedic Surgeons, Infectious Disease Specialists, and Clinical Microbiologists. Each participant invited personally by Dr Javad Parvizi, the head of ICM. Thus, it was such an honor to be invited to participate and represent the Philippines in this big meeting.

The work for ICM 2025 started in 2023. We were first asked to submit questions related to PJIs. Each question was then assigned to groups, headed by a

liaison; then each group proceeded to collect and screen current literature for reference, to come up with an answer to their assigned question. Several months of email exchanges and discussions culminated in ICM 2025 Istanbul, where each liaison presented their group's findings and answers. After each presentation came a chance for discussions with the whole group and voting for consensus agreement (or disagreement). Some topics were controversial and had scarce literature reference: hence. consensus recommendations were made. It was a grueling three full days, but the meeting was a big success!

ICM 2025 was a wonderful experience. It was a chance to reconnect with old colleagues and friends and make new ones. The results of ICM 2025 will be published as a supplement in the Journal of Arthroplasty in July 2025.

We finalized plans for our subspecialty symposia, including a joint session with the Philippine Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine (POSSM) for the upcoming 76th POA Annual Congress, with POSSM President Dr. Raphael Jurilla present.

During the 24th Congress of the Asia Pacific Orthopaedic Association (APOA) in Cairns, Australia on 9-12 April 2025, Dr. Ronquillo was co-chair for the Hand and Upper Limb Symposium (HULS) while Dr. Italia gave a lecture on When to Use Reverse Shoulder Arthroplasty for Proximal Arthroplasty for Proximal Humerus Fractures and Doing It Right the First Time; and presented multiple free papers.

Invited by their fellowship mentor, Professor George Murrell, Dr. Ronguillo and Dr. Jana Tumpalan returned to Australia as international faculty for the 30th St. George Shoulder Conference in Sydney on May 29-30, 2025. They were joined by many of Prof. Murrell's former fellows from around the world now all distinguished shoulder specialists in their respective nations. Dr. Tumpalan gave a lecture on the Clinical Diagnosis of Rotator Cuff Tears, and Dr. Ronguillo addressed Treatment Options for Massive Rotator Cuff Tears. They were among the faculty who led workshops on Examination of the Shoulder for physiotherapists and students, as well as RTDs with medical students from the University of New South Wales.

As Scientific Committee chair, Dr. Ronquillo organized the first APOA-HULS Webinar of 2025 on Instability in the Upper Limb. Held on June 21, 2025, the webinar attracted a global audience, featured lectures and expert commentary from Asia-Pacific senior surgeons; and, Dr. Tumpalan was moderator for the shoulder session.

Dr. Ronquillo represented PShS at the 13th ASEAN Society for Sports Medicine and Arthroscopy Combined Meeting with the 5th Congress and the 13th Annual Meeting of Indonesian Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine and Arthroscopy (ASSA-IOSSMA) in Bali, Indonesia in August 2025. He delivered 3 lectures on Examination

Kerwin Dela Cruz, Aldwyn Nicolas, and Dexter Ramos.

The society maintains its thrust for continuing education and research. Dr. Italia expands her impressive research portfolio with four new publications in the Journal of Shoulder and Elbow Surgery International for 2025; one as the lead author: "Improving Glenoid Guidewire Placement In Shoulder Arthroplasty: A Comparative Study of Mixed Reality Holographic Overlay Technique With Freehand Technique And Conventional Navigation".

Dr. Ronquillo continues to contribute as peer reviewer for the Journal of Orthopaedic Surgery and Research, BMC Musculoskeletal Disorders, Australia-New Zealand (ANZ) Journalof Surgery, Australasian Journal of Ultrasound Medicine, and our very own Philippine Journal of Orthopaedics. Continuing Professional Development

The **UP-PGH** Department Orthopedics hosted two hands on educational events further strengthening local expertise in Basic Ilizarov Techniques and Deformity Correction. The 24th Basic Ilizarov Sawbone & Cadaveric Workshop (February 22-23) and the Deformity Correction Workshop (May offered surgeons, residents, allied professionals an immersive learning experience combining theory, simulation, and cadaveric practice.

The 24th Basic Ilizarov Sawbone & Cadaveric Workshop

This two day workshop maintained its reputation as a cornerstone training event for Ilizarov and external fixation methods. Participants rotated through sawbone models and cadaveric specimens, applying circular fixators and performing osteotomies under guided supervision. These simulations allowed for hands on mastery of frame assembly, pin placement, safe zones, and controlled adjustments, bridging theoretical planning with tactile experience.


Deformity Correction Workshop

The event gathered orthopaedic surgeons, radiologists, pathologists, oncologists, and rehabilitation specialists all driven by a shared mission: to strengthen collaboration in the diagnosis and treatment of musculoskeletal tumors.

The discussions on a multidisciplinary case conference was led Dr. Josh Rosales and moderated by Dr. Marie Jeanne Bertol. The morning sessions was summarized and closed by PMTS President, Dr. Charles Villamin.

A Biopsy Workshop was kickstarted in the afternoon by a lecture on Principles

Individual biopsy stations were set up, where participants honed their core needle vagoid techniques using upo, cucumber and tomato under the guidance **PMTS** of faculty including Drs Rex Peñaranda and Connie De Vera. The session emphasized that a wellplanned and properly executed biopsy remains one of the most critical steps in musculoskeletal tumor management. Concurrently broadcast was а live surgical resection of а thiah liposarcoma by Drs. Gaston and Rosales.

The event marks a milestone: a collaboration between POA-NM, NMMC, and PMTS is

the first of its kind -- bringing together a scientific conference, a hands-on biopsy workshop, and live surgery focused on musculoskeletal tumors. All for a worthy goal of building bridges and raising the standards of care for our patients with musculoskeletal tumors.

UP-PGH Ortho and AFOTS hold Pelvis and Acetabulum Cadaveric Course

July 12, 2025 | UP-Philippine General Hospital. The UP-PGH Department of Orthopaedics, in collaboration with the Association of Filipino Orthopaedic Trauma Surgeons (AFOTS), successfully conducted the Pelvis and Acetabulum Cadaveric Course at the Dualan Anatomy Laboratory Complex.

The program opened with a focused lecture series on commonly used minimally invasive techniques for pelvis and acetabulum surgery, followed by a hands-on workshop that featured 3D-printed pelvic models developed by the UP Surgical Innovation and Biotechnology Laboratory (UP SIBOL) and Thiel soft-embalmed cadavers provided by the Department of Anatomy, UP College of Medicine.

In addition to the anatomical specimens, the workshop was equipped with three C-arm machines that allowed participants to simulate complex fixation techniques with the same precision and fluoroscopic guidance used in actual surgical procedures.

A total of 38 participants—composed of POA fellows and orthopaedic residents— and fellows-in-training—representing 22 institutions across the Philippines attended the course, highlighting the growing interest in pelvis and acetabulum surgery among trainees nationwide.

The course was led by Dr. Irewin Tabu and Dr. Kiko Cortez, with the dedicated support of the AFOTS faculty: Dr. Joseph Garvy Lai, Dr. Jean Pierre Leung, Dr. Maria Adelwisa Belen, Dr. Benjamin Chua III, Dr. Rodel Banggiacan, Dr. Kristoffer Roland Roa, Dr. Camille Santos, Dr. Federico Aquino III, and Dr. Alvin Hernandez.

With the success of the course, AFOTS









has committed to organizing another cadaveric workshop next year—continuing its mission to advance trauma education, strengthen surgical skills, and improve patient outcomes

in orthopaedic trauma care throughout the Philippines.

Steps to Walk Philippines 2025: A Successful Collaboration for Foot and Ankle Health

On August 24, 2025, the DLSUMC of Orthopaedic Department collaboration with the Association of Hand Surgeons of the Philippines (AHSP) and UP-PGH Department of Orthopaedics - Section of Hand Surgery conducted a cadaveric workshop entitled "Conquering D.E.F.E.C.T.S -Developing Effective Flap Elevation in Cadaveric Training and Simulation." The activity was attended by 24 consultants, fellows, residents and allied health professionals, reflecting the department's commitment to advancing academic excellence and clinical practice.

The course was directed by Dr. Raymar Sibonga. Dr. Joaquin Pandanan gave the opening remarks. Dr. Rafael Bundoc of the Anatomy Department of the UP-PGH College of Medicine reminded us on the proper conduct of this activity. Dr. Michael Muñoz gave the closing remarks.













The workshop focused on the critical role of soft tissue coverage in the management of musculoskeletal injuries, particularly for open fractures, chronic infections, and soft tissue defects associated with trauma. Lectures emphasized the types of flap commonly utilized for soft tissue reconstruction of the lower extremity. The cadaveric dissection portion focused on the proper templating and design, superficial and deep dissection, pedicle identification, flap rotation and inset of each type of flap with their advantages and disadvantages based on the area and extent of the soft tissue defect.

The activity was a valuable platform for sharing expertise, reviewing current standards of care, and exploring recent advances in soft tissue reconstruction. Through this event, the department reaffirmed its dedication to the continuous professional development of its members and its mission to provide the highest standard of orthopaedic and reconstructive care.

The First Orthopaedic and Rehabilitation Medicine Summit



The first-ever orthopaedic and Rehabilitation Medicine Summit was held on July 4 to 5, 2025 at the Unilab Bayanihan Center, Mandaluyong City. This milestone gathering brought together Medical Center Chiefs, Chiefs of Medical Professional Staff, Department Heads of Orthopaedics and Rehabilitation Medicine from DOH-designated specialty hospitals, as well as leaders in musculoskeletal care, nursing, education, and health policy.

With the theme "Strengthening the Referral System and Developing Regional Orthopaedic Rehabilitation Medicine Specialty Centers in the Country," the summit was convened in line with two landmark legislations: the Universal Health Care Law (RA 11223), which ensures equitable access to specialized services nationwide, and the Regional Specialty Centers Act (RA 11959), which identified the different regional specialty centers designated the Philippine Orthopaedic Center (POC) as the national apex hospital for orthopaedics and rehabilitation medicine.

The objectives of the summit were:

 Align training, research, and service delivery with the UHC framework to guarantee accessible, affordable, and quality musculoskeletal and



disability care.

- Discuss strategies for developing and operationalizing regional specialty centers.
- Highlight innovations, best practices, and policy directions that strengthen orthopaedic and rehabilitation services nationwide.
- 4. Strengthen the referral system among regional specialty centers

Over two days, participants engaged in plenary lectures, policy dialogues, and breakout sessions that tackled clinical advances, multidisciplinary models of care, workforce development, and health systems integration. A strong focus was placed on capacity-building and training the next generation of specialists. There were about 200 participants from 48 institutions including all the 25 designated regional specialty centers, 9 LGU hospitals, 4 teaching institutions, 5 non-government organizations, and 5 national government agencies.

The summit concluded with a shared commitment to sustain the momentum of the UHC Law and the Regional Specialty Centers Act by strengthening partnerships, improving referral pathways, and ensuring equitable access to world-class orthopaedic and rehabilitation care for every Filipino. Importantly, it also set the direction

for succeeding summits, which aim to broaden stakeholder participation, address emerging challenges, and support regional specialty centers in realizing their full potential.

The Spine Section of the Department Orthopaedics of Chong Hua successfully conducted Hospital its 10th Postgraduate Spine Course on UBE Essentials: Building your **Endoscopic Spine Surgery Foundation** last October 4, 2025 at the 12th Floor Auditorium of Chong Hua Mandaue. The second part of the workshop utilized swine specimens so that participants can practice soft tissue dissection, bonv resection, and instrument familiarization. These hands-on





components allowed participants to correlate theoretical knowledge with operative technique, thereby reinforcing safe and effective surgical practice. The program fostered active engagement and knowledge exchange among faculty and attendees, reflecting a shared commitment to advancing minimally invasive spine surgery in the region.

The pioneering case highlights the growing expertise of Filipino orthopaedic surgeons in advanced limb and spine reconstruction techniques and underscores ASAMI Philippines' mission to introduce innovative, life-changing procedures that improve patient outcomes and expand the frontiers of orthopaedic care in the nation.

POSP has played a leading role in raising awareness and promoting the proper management of clubfoot in the Philippines. About ten years ago, the Philippine National Clubfoot Program was launched in partnership with Miracle Feet and the Philippine NGO Council for Population, Health and Welfare, Inc. This initiative established clinics across the country in various settings-government and private hospitals, clinics, and ambulatory centers-providing suraerv free casting materials and braces. A dedicated training team, predominantly composed of POSP members, works to equip more healthcare providers with the necessary treatment skills.

In alignment with global goals, the Philippines has a Memorandum of

Understanding with the Global Clubfoot Initiative to support its RunFree 2030 vision.

In 2024, the inclusion of clubfoot in a national birth defect registry, spearheaded by Dr. Carmencita Padilla, was a significant step. Dr. Juanito Javier led the formation of the Philippine National Clubfoot Council for this effort, resulting in clubfoot being added to the expanded newborn screening form. The council's long-term goal is to achieve a self-sustaining Clubfoot Program through adequate funding from Philhealth and support from the Department of Health, Furthermore, the Clinical Practice Guidelines for the Treatment of Clubfoot are expected to be finalized in 2025, which will formalize management recommendations

and guide the implementation of the Clubfoot Referral Pathway.

To celebrate its 25th year, POSP will hold the annual Interesting Case Contest in honor of Dr. Vicente Gomez. The society has also prepared collaborative sessions with other societies and a dedicated Cerebral Palsy Summit to discuss topics relevant into adulthood. The celebration will culminate in a special thanksgiving event to honor the founders and mentors and commemorate the society's achievements over the past quarter-century.

Ang Paglalakbay ng PUSO Philippine Ultrasound Society in Orthopedics



Musculoskeletal Ultrasonology (MSKUS) is fast becoming a beneficial armament in the expeditious pointof-care diagnostic and therapeutic management of a good percentage of musculoskeletal pathologies. From the first published article on the "Measurement of Articular Cartilage by ultrasound "by Dr. Karl Theodore Dussic in 1958 to the first clinically relevant paper in 1972 by Drs. Daniel McDonald and George Leopold on the diagnostic use of ultrasound to differentiate Baker's cyst from thrombophlebitis; the use of ultrasound in all orthopaedic subspecialties has enabled it to be a convenient musculoskeletal "stethoscope" of the future.

started Our journey when rheumatologist, Dr Millicent Ong, attended a Musculoskeletal Ultrasound Society (MUSOC) meeting in 2005 and met Dr. Antonio Bouffard, a MusculoskeletalRadiologistspecializing in MSKUS. What followed was a round table discussion in December 2005 and the establishment of the first known Musculoskeletal Ultrasound workshop in 2007 at the University of Santo Tomas Faculty of Medicine and

Surgery Continuing Medical Education Hall. The Philippine Society of Clinical Musculoskeletal Ultrasonology (PSCMU), comprised of orthopaedic rheumatologists surgeons, Rehabilitation Medicine specialists, was founded in 2010 with Dr Bee Giok Tan- Sales as the first President, A series of workshops followed and the society has been giving annual Basic and Interventional workshops for the advancement of the art of MSKUS. These were attended by orthopaedic surgeons who professed their desire to enhance their skills in diagnostic and interventional ultrasonology.

Globally, MSKUS was gaining traction in the realm of orthopaedics. The Japan Society of Orthopedic Ultrasonics (JASOU) was established in 1988, and in a 2021 study published in BMC Musculoskeletal Disorders, 46.5% of Japanese orthopaedic surgeons are using ultrasonography in their clinics for musculoskeletal disorders for Point-of-Care Ultrasound (POCUS).

In the joint convention of the POA and Asia Pacific Orthopaedic Association (APOA) in November 24, 2022, Dr. Hiroshi


Minagawa, JASOU founding president, his fellow members shared new minimally invasive orthopaedic procedures with ultrasonic guidance. Topics included "Pathophysiology of Musculoskeletal Disorders interpreted by Peripheral Nerves: the Role of Ultrasound guided Hydrorelease" by Dr Hiroshi Minagawa; "Ultrasound guided removing of foreign bodies" by Dr Kazuma Miyatake; "Ultrasound guided scraping and reconstruction of Achilles tendon" by Dr Jun Sasahara; "Ultrasound guided tenotomy by using "TENEX" by Dr Toru Omodani; "Preand post-operative pain management using ultrasound images" by Dr Hiroshi Minagawa; "Ultrasound guided cervical nerve block" by Dr Hiroshi Iwasaki; "Ultrasound guided hand surgery" by Dr Yasuaki Nakanishi; and, "Ultrasound guided Orthopaedic office procedures". At the 31st Midyear convention in Bacolod in 2023, a well attended hands on workshop session with the PSCMU was held for all residents and fellows. In 2024, an ICL on "Hand it to the Usual Suspects: Pathologies and treatment options" was presented with collaboration with AHSP.

In the 2025 MSK Ultrasound Asian Meeting in Kyoto, Japan, POA Fellow Dr. Janos F. Vizcayno Jr. was invited to lecture on Physical Examination for Shoulder Pain, Basics of Ultrasound Imaging and US-Guided Interventions. The meeting was attended by POA fellows from Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao.

October 2025 saw 2 courses by PSCMU with the Philippine Rheumatologic Association (PRA): an interventional cadaver course at the UP College of Medicine Department of Anatomy and a Basic MSKUS course at the Seda Hotel Manila Bay with Dr Ingrid Moller-Parerra, one of the luminaries of EULAR,

attended by orthopaedic surgeons, rehab med and rheumatologists.

These activities empowered a group of 79 POA fellows to form the Philippine Ultrasound Society in Orthopedics (PUSO) this 2025 with the vision of advancement of the practice of Musculoskeletal Ultrasonology in the orthopaedic community.

Their first official activity will be an Instructional Course Lecture during the Annual Congress on Nov 20,2025 with the theme of "Basic MSK Ultrasound: Essentials for General Orthopaedic Surgeons".

Brains, Rains, and Traffic Lanes: PBO Pulls Off 2025 In-Training Exams at UST Amid Chaos

October 19, 2025 I Manila. The Philippine Board of Orthopaedics pulled off a remarkable feat by successfully conducting its annual In-Training Examinations (ITEs) at the University of Santo Tomas (UST). The ITEs, an essential academic milestone for orthopaedic residents nationwide, faced unexpected challenges this year when they coincided with UST's Entrance Test Day (USTET). The overlap brought thousands of applicants and their families flooding the campus, resulting in overwhelming foot traffic, congested gates, and gridlocked roads surrounding the university.

Despite these obstacles, the PBO, under the leadership of Dr. Justiniano Bai, Head of the Examination Committee, ensured that the examinations proceeded smoothly and on schedule. A total of 367 examinees participated, including 113 first-year residents, 88 second-year residents, 65 third-year resident, and 72 graduating fourth-year residents completing the Qualifying Examination. Additionally, 29 examinees classified as PBO Level 0 were also accommodated in the testing process.

The Board had meticulously prepared four different sets of examinations, each designed specifically for the corresponding training level. These were carefully crafted based on the official Test Blueprint which was discussed and agreed upon during the annual PBO-Training Officers (PBO-TO) meeting held on January 25, 2025. The blueprint guided the content, scope, and difficulty of the exams to ensure that the knowledge and skills evaluated aligned with the competencies expected of residents at each stage. To maintain high academic standards, the Board also conducted a minimum passing level (MPL) - setting session on September 27, 2025, which formally established the cutoff scores for each examination set.

Faced with the anticipated logistical challenges caused by the concurrent

USTET, the Board took proactive measures to assist examinees. A detailed walk-through video was created, demonstrating the route from the designated entrance at the Lacson Avenue gate to the examination venue inside the campus. This video was disseminated through the official Viber thread used by the examinees, enabling them to navigate the crowded campus efficiently. Furthermore, the Board reminded all examinees through their respective training officers to arrive early, emphasizing the importance of allowing extra time to avoid any delays due to the heavy crowds and traffic.

On top of these challenges, the threat of Typhoon Ramil loomed over Luzon that weekend. Fortunately, although intermittent rain fell throughout the day, the flood-prone UST campus was spared from any serious flooding, allowing all examinees to safely reach the testing site.

In the end, despite the compounded pressures of heavy traffic, overlapping events, and unpredictable weather, the 2025 PBO In-Training Examinations were conducted successfully and without incident. The Board extends its deepest appreciation to all examinees, training officers, and institutional partners whose professionalism, cooperation, and resilience ensured the smooth execution of this important event in orthopaedic education.
